5. To affiliate with SLSA or such other association or body from time to time responsible for the administration of Surf Life Saving in Australia and with such similar State and/or District Associations as may be necessary or considered desirable by the Committee.
6. To arrange youth activities and functions for members.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

On behalf of the Executive and General Committee, I am pleased to present the 114th Annual Report for your consideration and adoption.

This report documents the activities of the Collaroy Surf Life Saving Club Inc. for the 2025-2026 Season and includes the Audited Financial Statement and Balance Sheet for the year ended 30th April 2026.

The last Annual General Meeting was held on 3rd August 2025. Members of the Executive elected were Mark Anderson, Jesse Bowyer, Liz Green, Stuart Spencer, Andrew Sole. Gregg Armstrong accepted the Nipper Chair role after the AGM.

At the AGM Liz Green and Richard Trim were awarded Life Membership. Five members were awarded Distinguished Service membership – Jesse Bowyer, Nicole Bridges, Tricia Hamilton, Sue Perry, Kelly Trim.

Membership

We were saddened to hear of the passing of four members this season. To the families of the late Peter Rumble, Anne Koth; Evelyn Langbein, Peter Gibb and Jason Farrell we extend our sincere sympathy for your loss.

Patrols

Patrols were again well attended, with 7285 hours logged. Congratulations and thanks to all patrolling members for maintaining a safe beach this season. Congratulations to Patrol 5 and Fiona Hall for their Patrol of Year / Patrol Captain awards. Collaroy hosted NSW Emergency Services Minister and

SLSNSW for a season surf safety announcement in December.

Community Service

Club support for community service events continued during the year, including the Beach2Beach Fun Run and Anzac Day Sunset Service. Hire of the club hall was provided at no cost to a small number of groups as recognition for and in support of the broader community service they provide. Regular and returning community service groups across the Northern Beaches area also provided a steady function hire of the hall through the year

Functions

Our annual Golf Day was held on 4th January and the Annual Life and Distinguished Service Members' Luncheon held on 27th April, with both being well attended.

Function patronage and hall hire throughout the year continues to provide a steady revenue stream to fund club endeavours. Congratulations to the Venue Team for their support in managing the Collaroy SLSC venue and bar.

Competition

The March Past and Boat sections were both strongly represented with competitors enjoying success at local carnivals, Branch and State Championships and at the Aussies.

Congratulations to The Giants Open Women's boat crew, selected as Collaroy's first ever Australian representative boat crew in the Trans-Tasman Surf challenge, held at Elouera beach in February.



The Australian Titles were conducted at North Kirra and Tugun on the Gold Coast Queensland this season. Success was seen in Youth, Masters and Opens events contested, with gold, silver and bronze medals in water, beach, march past and boat arenas. A highlight would be the two Open Women's crews in the final. This season's carnivals results are presented later in the report. Congratulations to all red cap competitors.

Club Events

The club continues to host and see good patronage for the annual Collaroy Ocean swim (November) and "Weekend @ The Roy" (January) carnivals.

The "Weekend @ The Roy" carnival added R&R, a Surf Belt race and March past events to the annual Collaroy Young Guns carnival. The expanded format has proven a great success, with patronage by boat crews only bettered by State and Australian titles entries. This event continues to go from strength to strength, now showcasing four disciplines across the surf movement.

Branch/State Involvement

Collaroy members also continue to support Sydney Northern Beaches Branch through BOEA and BOSS committees and Branch panels, Branch Support Operations through RWC operators, Duty Officer roles, and TIPS team members.

Nine club members (four individual and one team) were acknowledged with nominations for Branch Awards of Excellence. Janine Fahey was acknowledged as Branch Administrator of the Year. Collaroy won the Branch Carnival Handicap Pointscore and were presented with a Bennett surf rescue board.

Nippers

Nippers registration this season was just over 350, another good year. Dash Armstrong was selected as Branch representative and became the first Australian Youth titles medallist for Collaroy. Our junior members sent the largest State team in a few years to the State Age Titles held at Blacksmith's Beach, Swansea. Season results are included at the back of this report. To Gregg and his Committee, congratulations again on a great season.

Premises

The BBQ shed, kitchen and showers received upgraded ventilation this season, to maintain the club upkeep. And planning is well progressed on two more initiatives due to commence shortly after the AGM – Gym extension and Coolrom Upgrade/relocation.

Thanks are extended to the Sponsorship Team for their dedicated work in realising sponsorship, grants, and the generous benefactors that fund a variety of club endeavours. LIFE MEMBERSHIP

Two members were awarded Life Membership at the 2025 AGM.

Liz Green

As a 7-year-old in 1998, Liz joined the Club's Nipper programme starting in the under 8s, and working through the age groups, competing in Junior activities until joining the open ranks of the surf club in 2004, obtaining her Surf Rescue Certificate followed by her Bronze Medallion in 2007. Not one to sit around, Liz has played an active role involving herself in some of the most demanding roles in the club.

In 2013 she became Club Vice-Captain, Chief Instructor in 2014 and in 2016 became Club Captain, a role she held for 7 years until 2023.

In 2023, she stepped down from being Club Captain taking on the role of Vice-President, a position she holds today. For 12 continuous years, commencing in 2014, Liz has remained an active member on the Club Executive and General Committee.



For over 20 years since 2004, Liz has been a patrolling member of the club, annually completing over 50 hours of voluntary service.

On the competition side of our movement, Liz has competed in both R&R, March Past and latterly has spent many years in the Surf Boat arena. Over the years, Liz has won many medals of all three colours at all levels of competition,

including our local Branch, NSW State and Australian Championships. Along with her crew mates in 2012, Liz was an interstate Surf Boat Representative.

Along with her SRC and Bronze Medallion Awards, Liz has an outstanding record of involvement, and it is hard to list all of her achievements - here are a few –

- Training Officers award for SRC, Surf Bronze and ARTC.
- Assessors Award (Bronze, Spinal Management, Advanced Resuscitation).
- IRB Crew and First Aid Certificate;
- Basic Beach Management (Patrol Captain).

At Branch level Liz has been a Member of the Board of Life Saving and currently is a Member of the Board of Education.

Since 2004, Liz has been the recipient

of many worthy club accolades, some of note include - Doug Graham Most Improved Member; Mick Hogan Most Improved Under 19 Member; 100% Patrol Attendance on numerous occasions; Frank Hall Boatman of the Year; Paul Booth Boat Crew of the Year; Joint Touring Team Captain; Bill Goodman Most Outstanding Committee member; and the Dick Twight Pursuit of Excellence Award.

Liz has an outstanding record of service to the Collaroy Surf Club and continues to be actively involved at all levels. At the 2017 AGM Liz was a recipient of the Distinguished Service Award.

Richard Trim



When Richard's children, Mitchell, Kelly and Jodie, started to show an interest in becoming part of the Nipper movement at the Collaroy Surf Club, it seemed a natural fit that Richard would become involved too.

Initially, Richard joined the club with son Mitchell in 1995. Not being one to sit back and watch proceedings, Richard quickly established himself as a hands-on man, gaining his Bronze Medallion in 1998 and joining the Nipper Committee, where he was to spend the next ten years, 1998-2008.

Leadership roles that Richard held on that Committee were Vice-Chairman 2002-2004 and 2007-2008, and in the years in between 2004-2007 he was Nipper Chairman. With that role, he held a position on the Club Executive Committee.

With his children firmly ensconced competing in both sections of the club, Richard brought his administrative skills

to the senior ranks and whilst on the General Committee, fulfilled the roles of Publicity Officer and Junior Liaison Officer.

It would not be long before Richard became Club President, a leadership role he conducted with distinction for three years 2010-2013.

Club awards Richard has received are:

- 2010 - Most outstanding Committee Member.
- 2010 - recipient of the President's Trophy.
- Sub Committees include 2012-2019 Annual Report Committee.

To this day he is an annual participant and contributor at club work parties for events held at Collaroy, working bees or wherever a hand is required or advice sought.

Richard is the ultimate no frills quiet achiever - his leadership, enthusiasm and organisational skills have been to the fore for the entirety of his 30-year membership of our surf club.

DISTINGUISHED SERVICE MEMBERSHIP

Five members were awarded distinguished service membership at the 2025 AGM.

Jesse Bowyer



Jesse has been a member of the Collaroy Surf Life Saving Club since 2003 when he joined as a Nipper. Following seven years of coming through the age groups,

as a 13-year-old he obtained his Surf Rescue Certificate and started patrolling. He obtained his Bronze Medallion in 2012.

Now graduated to the senior section of the club, for the next 14 years to his current position as Club Captain Jesse has whole heartedly devoted his young life to public safety, beach patrols and encouragement of members to gain SLSA awards related to beach safety, become patrolling members, including a Patrol Captain – managing all aspects of a team on patrol duty.

- He obtained his First Aid award in 2016.
- Silver Medallion – Beach Management in 2016.
- Advanced Resuscitation Award in 2017.

Since 2019 he has been an endorsed delegate, Bronze Medallion / SRC. The endorsed delegate can assist with Skills Maintenance (annual member proficiency and skills update).

As a respected patrolling club member, Jesse has logged over 1000 voluntary patrol hours of which meritoriously over 200 of those are volunteer, not rostered.

Throughout his years of service to the club he has achieved the following;

- Top 10 patrol hours award 5 times
- Patrol Captain of the year.
- Junior patrol person of the year.
- 100% patrol hours.

In 2015 as a Club Vice Captain to lessen the load of the Club Captain, he took on duties that go unnoticed or unthanked. In 2023 he took on the role of Club Captain. This role elevated him to a position on the Club's Executive Committee, where his leadership ability is coming to the fore. Patrols are being covered well, and Jesse is continually putting forward ideas to improve this vital area of beach management.

In addition to his commitment towards beach management and a safe Collaroy Beach for all to enjoy, Jesse has had an unsatiable appetite for competing in Rescue & Resuscitation (R&R) events. Since his nipper days (2005) onwards he has enjoyed an amazing amount of

success. Firstly, it was 2 person R&R with his great friend Jake de Kort, where they continually swept all before them. In the senior section of the competition with his teammates, he competed in both 5 person and 6 person R&R. His success rate is nothing short of phenomenal - at our three major competitions of Branch, NSW State and Australian Championships, of all three medal colours Jesse has won 73 medals.

The main ones being Championship gold, of the 73 he has won, 27 are gold medals; at Sydney Northern Beaches Branch - 11, NSW State - 9 and Australian Championships - 7 gold medals.

Nicole Bridges



Nicole first became involved in the club as a nipper during the 1993/1994 season.

She began twenty-four years of involvement with the Rescue & Resuscitation (R R) event in 1996, when she commenced as a member of a two-person R & R team. As well as competing in R & R enjoying great success over the years, Nicole also coaches both two and five person teams from Under 11's to Under 17's.

Each season she has been actively involved with encouraging nippers to make up R&R teams. Second only to the de Kort's, Nicole is leading the way and a driving force in getting members involved in R & R.

During October of 1998, Nicole obtained her Surf Bronze Medallion and over the ensuing years she has obtained a further nine beach/surf rescue related awards.

1996/97 Nicole was a member of the

Sydney Northern Beaches Branch Representative Team.

As an active patrolling member Nicole was a Patrol Captain for four years 2001/05.

Over the years on eight occasions, Nicole has been a member of either March Past or R&R teams that at the club's annual presentation night have been a recipient of Team of the Year award.

During the seasons of 1999/00 and 2016/17, Nicole was the recipient of the prestigious Ray Barker Memorial R & R Award.

Since 2015 for eleven years, Nicole has been a contributing member on the General Committee, which includes her ongoing role as Club's R & R Captain.

During 2014, following a six-year absence, Nicole rejoined the club and immediately became a regular member of the Ladies March Past Team, which at all levels of competition continues to attain a phenomenal amount of success. In 2023, Nicole was the recipient of the Club's Most Outstanding March Past Competitor award.

At our three major Annual Surf Life Saving Competitions of local Branch, NSW State or Australian Championships, Nicole has been a team member of either March Past or R & R teams which won either gold, silver or bronze colours. She has won fifty medals, highlights being the five Australian Gold, eight NSW State Gold and nine Branch Gold medals.

At the 2018/19 World Championships she won a bronze medal and at the 2023/24 World Championships our ladies were crowned World Champions when they won the gold medal.

In early 2000, Nicole was a member of the Club's Under 19 educational touring team to New Zealand

Nicole became Vice-Chairman on our Nipper Committee in 2024.

Nicole's contribution is a great asset to the club. She has always actively tried to increase team participation within the nippers, often single handedly. Nicole is admired by her peers for giving back to the sport by coaching and officiating.

Her achievements are as follows:

She has packed a lot into her 25 years of membership and is now giving back to the sport by coaching and officiating.

Tricia Hamilton



Tricia joined the club in 1992, gaining her Bronze Medallion Award during 1993.

For over 30 years, she has involved herself in all aspects of the Surf Club and along the way established two firsts:

In 1997, she became our club's first female Club Captain, which was also a position on our Clubs' Executive Committee.

In 2022, she became the first female to be a member of the club's very active Premises Committee, a position she still maintains.

Tricia has been an exemplary leader, dedicating countless hours, expertise and an unwavering passion to swimming training, key roles and continued development of the Collaroy club, and our local community.

She was the initiator and remains heavily involved with the club's swimming program, which continues to thrive. She demonstrated unmatched dedication and vision ensuring its expedited implementation to benefit the club and community.

She continues to support twice yearly training weeks where, over the past few years, she has played an integral role. Her hands-on involvement from assisting with all aspects of the program ensures that all participants gain valuable skills and confidence, as they sit either the Surf Rescue Certificate or Bronze Medallion awards.

Along with being a current patrolling member of the club, Tricia enjoys the swimming side of competitions and over the years has enjoyed a considerable amount of success winning medals at the SNB Branch and NSW State Championships. During the 90's Tricia was a very active, competitive team member of our successful IRB Racing Team until fracturing her ankle during competition put an end to her competing in that sport.

Whilst she has spent many years on the Club's General Committee, Tricia has also found time to take on the position of Club Secretary, Senior Vice-Captain, a member of the Club's Constitution committee and assistant Team Manager to the 1994 NSW State and Australian Championships.

She was a member of the Branch Board of Examiners for six years 1997 /2003

In 2017 Tricia received her 25-year Service award and in 2023 received her 30-year Service award.

Since 2002 to present (23 years), Tricia has been a significant generous Sponsor of the Surf Club.

Tricia's tireless efforts and unwavering dedication have had a lasting impact on our club. Her leadership, mentoring and enthusiasm have inspired both current and future generations of Surf Life

Savers. Tricia embodies the true spirit of Surf Life Saving, making her a very deserving recipient of our Distinguished Service Award.

Sue Perry



Sue joined the club when the first of her three children started Nippers in 1991. For 34 years Sue has been a quiet achiever around the club. One would consider Sue to be a loyal and committed club member, often working behind the scenes with little or no recognition.

Sue's contributions include;

- For several years was a member of the club's Nipper Committee.
- Assisted with Nipper activities for some twelve years.
- In the senior section of the club Sue assisted and supported the R&R section for 15 years.
- For five seasons assisted the Club Captain by entering all the members club patrol logged hours in Surf guard.
- For some 15 years assisted with behind-the-scenes necessities including catering for officials at carnivals such as East Coast Masters and Branch Championships hosted by Collaroy.
- From 1999 until recently, Sue was responsible for co-ordinating and managing our U17, U21 and U23 March past teams at Branch, NSW State and Australian Championships.

Kelly Trim



Thirty-two years ago, during the 1994/95 Surf Life Saving season, Kelly joined the Nippers at Collaroy as a five-year-old and remains to this day an active and dedicated member.

Since obtaining her Bronze Medallion during 2002/2003, Kelly has amassed some seven hundred and forty patrolling hours over twenty-two seasons, several as patrol captain, and gained many awards related to beach management and surf safety. These include notably:

- Silver Medallion (Beach Management);
- IRB Crew Certificate;

- Advanced Resuscitation Techniques Certificate; and
- recent qualification as a Surf Sports Official.

With her teammates, Kelly has and still is enjoying success at all levels of major competition. At our Branch, NSW State and Australian Championships in her three competition disciplines at the highest level of R & R, March Past and Surf Boat Rowing, in the three medal colours she has won forty-five medals which include: five Gold Medals at Branch; nine Gold Medals at NSW State; and six Gold medals at the Australian Championships.

Kelly's dedication to beach safety and competition over many years has seen her acknowledged with several club awards including:

- Most Outstanding Team in Competition (twice);
- Most Outstanding March Past Competitor;
- U19 Female Club Champion;
- Boatman of the Year in 2012 and the Presidents Trophy with her "Queen Bees" Boat Crew.

One of Kelly's strengths is bringing people together. She has been instrumental in developing and is the driving force behind Ladies' Day, a now annual event which bridges the generational gap and strengthens the bond across all areas of the club.

She constantly makes herself available to listen and help where required. Kelly's influence on our younger members cannot be understated as it has had a very positive impact throughout the club.

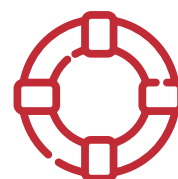

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES BOARD “NIPPERS”

The 2025/26 season once again highlighted the strength, spirit and continued growth of our Nippers program at Collaroy.

This season saw strong participation across most age groups, with over 350 Nippers registered. Favourable conditions most Sunday mornings ensured an enjoyable experience for the kids, and a big thankyou to the continued involvement of all the Age Managers and parents who make each session successful. We had a concerted effort this year to grow our Age Manager numbers and increase parent involvement, and the benefits were clear in the enjoyment of both kids and parents each week.

Our beaches encountered more marine activity than usual this season and I want to thank Ben Crabbe, Clive Thompson and our patrolling members for providing IRB support each week to keep our kids safe.

The highlight for every Nipper each Sunday is their sausage sandwich and Zooper Dooper at the end of the session. Our BBQ Coordinators, Mitch & Josh, continue to work tirelessly over the hotplate to ensure the bacon, eggs and snags are ready as the kids finish. This BBQ is our main fundraiser each season and we really appreciate the assistance and support of all parents who contribute throughout the year.

We had a small cohort of U14s this year, who were presented with their parting gifts on presentation day as they completed the Collaroy Nippers program and progress into the Collaroy Breakers cadet program in the senior club. I look forward to seeing their continued involvement in the years ahead.

On the competition side, we saw continued growth in

participation at both local and state levels. This growth reflects the enthusiasm & commitment from our water coaches (Blake & Lauren) and beach coach (Ryan). Training for our competitive Nippers began in July, leading into our annual training weekend at Umina. Attendance grew to over 80 this year, with the camp held in early September prior to the formal Nipper season commencing. Thank you to Erin White for organising this popular and enjoyable weekend, along with all the parents who helped train and support the kids fostering a strong and inclusive Collaroy team culture.

We had strong participation at all the local carnivals throughout the season, including 20 attendees at the U8s introductory carnival at Bilgola. As the Branch Championships were held at Queenscliff beach, our team achieved an outstanding result: 4x gold medals, 9x silver medals and 3 bronze medals. Congratulations to all the participants and medal winners on a fantastic effort.

This season also saw our first Sydney Norther Beaches representative in nearly 10 years, with Dash Armstrong selected in the U13 Age Group to compete in water events against other NSW branches. Congratulations Dash.

Our largest team in several years attended the State Championships at Swansea Belmont, with 40 competitors making the trip and many staying at Blacksmiths Caravan Park. Dash made several finals, including the surf race and ironperson, and finished with a silver medal in the 2km ocean swim. Congratulations on an outstanding achievement.

coaches, handlers, tent providers and trailer drivers who make competition possible. In particular, John and Janine Fahey continue to give up their time each season to support and assist our Nipper competition team.

At presentation day, I presented two major awards. The Chairman's Award was awarded to Cullen Bosward. The Nippers program is about inclusion, participation, encouragement, education, competition, and most importantly, enjoyment - and Cullen embodies all these qualities in both Sunday Nippers & Carnivals. Congratulations Cullen.

The Chairman's Committee Award is always a difficult decision given the many people who dedicate significant time throughout the season. This year's recipient was Erin White. Erin stepped into the Vice Chair role, organises the proficiency at the start of the season at In2Swim, arranges the Umina training camp, manages social media, acts as our unofficial photographer, serves as a Competition and State Team Manager, and regularly assists with water safety and coaching. PREMISES COMMITTEE REPORT

The Premises Committee for the 2025/26 season comprised Gerry Cooney (Secretary), Greg Broome, Brendan Dunkin, Graham Hart, Tricia Hamilton, Doug Patrick and Geoff Small as Chairman. As in past seasons when we all came together, I would like to thank you all as a collective for your efforts throughout the season in maintaining and upgrading of the club's premises.

We have had four major undertakings this past season.

- 1/ The complete revamping of the BBQ's and necessary electrical and plumbing work carried out within the nipper shed. For many years the BBQ room has been a borderline health hazard. The revamping of it comprised the purchase of two new large stainless-steel BBQ's suitable for indoor cooking; a large stainless-steel splash back; replacement of the inferior extractor fan and ventilation system (installed ducting is also eliminating the heat from the bar/cool room compressors at the rear of the room) with a new ventilation system to remove the smoke and odours and the purchase of a large hand basin to wash the trays and containers, which required a custom-made cupboard to house it. All up, the cost of the project was around \$22K.
- 2/ Kitchen extractor fan. What started out as a simple thought of requiring a motor replacement to enable the extractor fan above the two kitchen ovens working when in use, soon became a necessary and urgent project in completely renovating the extractor fan ducting up to and including a section on the roof, to house the new motor as the current system installed was closed off and not compliant - in fact was a health hazard and not meeting any of the required NSW Safety Standards. We now have an excellent, compliant system which provides to caterers, kitchen users and guests in the hall a healthy smoke, fume and odour free working and dining environment. Total cost of this project \$14.2K.
- 3/ Mentioned in last year's Annual report was the installation being carried out of an extractor fan ventilation system to take the steam and condensation from the men's showers to the outside of the building. This was successfully carried out under the guidance of Greg Broome. mentioned above alongside the extractor fan system in the Nipper shed. Total

costing for these two projects \$13.7K

- 4/ With the Caretakers flat requiring attention, for a moderate cost we completely renovated the toilet area, had lino floor polished and a deep clean of the caretakers flat prior to the new caretakers moving in, along with a healthy donation of labour content to the club from fellow member and builder, Darryl Gilmartin. Having not had a major service within the flat since its construction 13 years ago, this was \$7K well spent.

Tasks completed:

- All 15 first floor ceiling fans were inspected by three electrical companies, resulting in two fans requiring replacement with the job being carried out by Nathan Lavers Electrical. The remaining fans will be replaced as required.
- The internal concrete stairwell from the hall to the promenade looked untidy and required painting. A sand colour was chosen and the job carried out by Mike & Matt Bullivant.
- Hoses used around various sections of the club cleaning rescue & competition equipment have resulted in paint wearing off the corners of the walls. As a result, corner protectors on several doorways have been installed.
- A storage cupboard has been installed by Fox Wardrobes in the kitchen to store cleaning agents, mops/buckets and brooms.
- A constant issue for the club is sandy feet being carried from the beach up to the hall where the polyurethane sealant on the parquet flooring is being severely damaged. Two large signs at the base of the steps requesting sand to be removed from one's feet have worked wonders in protecting the floor.

Tasks in progress:

- For outdoor/beach announcements, at a cost of \$16K, General Committee approval has been gained for the upgrade of our beach PA system. Under the control of Greg Broome & Gregg Armstrong, this long overdue upgrade to be operated through our AV system will see two horns/speakers installed on the beachside of the building – planned to be up and running prior to the commencement of nippers in October.
- As this Annual Report goes to print, preparations are well under way for two "major" projects soon to commence and if all falls into place, both planned to be completed before the commencement of the 2026/27 season - towards the end of September. Within officialdom of local, state and federal governments, partial funding by way of approved grants of around \$100K for these two projects has enabled this to happen – for which we are most grateful.
- The extension of the gymnasium, otherwise known as the "training, education and development centre". This project has been four years in discussions and now with final quotes received, final approvals from Northern Beaches Council cannot be far away.

- The relocation of our cool room from its current position on the ground floor to where the club's office is currently situated with the entrance, also on the ground floor, to be located at the northern end of the building, off the paved area. Due to the high cost, the approved grant is enabling this to happen. Continual liaising with our Landlord, Northern Beaches Council and our own planning, see us now well past the quoting stage and after Expenditure Revue Committee approval is obtained, a commencement date can be set. The current cool room being around 40 years old, is small and our needs have outgrown it.

During last August, Gerry Cooney, Doug Patrick and I carried out an overdue two day walk through of the entire club. This familiarisation walk through has enabled Gerry to draw up an action plan spread sheet for us to record and co-ordinate maintenance issues and potential costings – also includes a report to follow, support financial forecasting and planning to address any concerns about increased financial cost, maintaining the building and tracking the progress of repair or replacement of necessary items of high expenditure.

Acknowledgements:

A special thanks to retired electrician and “Blue Oyster” club member, Steve Lavers, who for the past year “doing his bit for the club” has taken care of all our electrical maintenance and needs. His son, Nathan Lavers, has become our contracted electrician. Nathan quoted on the electrics for our proposed cool room and will be attending to that side of the project.

To Craig Thomas, who is extremely practical always makes himself available to assist either with advice or recently through his company, A.J. Aluminium, offered to supply by way of donation the two large windows for the new gym extension, which the club has gratefully accepted.

To the facilities team at Northern Beaches Council, who are responsible for the upkeep of the exterior of our building and with whom your Premises Committee works well on matters such as the servicing of our many electric roller doors, advice involving building matters or repairs to the building. To Nigel Hart, Donald Gibson, Greg Baker, Peter Rodham and Millie Alexander we say thank you for the prompt manner in which repairs have been carried out or advice forthcoming.

Thanks to President, Mark Anderson, his Executive and General Committee for your continued support of our projects, repairs and all matters undertaken on behalf of the membership. A special mention to outgoing Treasurer, Stu Spencer – thanks Stu for your unwavering support of our projects, email communication and financial guidance over many years. We wish you well and look forward to working with incoming Treasurer, Anthony Brown who has been by your side “learning the Collaroy way” of financial management this past season – welcome Anthony, with whom we are fast developing an excellent rapport.

In conclusion, I would like to recognise the positive contribution of our new caretakers, James Meadows and Bella Dunkin, who are ensuring our premises are nice and clean for all to enjoy. Having only commenced in the role last November, their



positive working relationship these past six months with the Clubs Executive and Premises Committee is appreciated - thanks to you both.

To all members of the Premises Committee - Gerry Cooney, Doug Patrick Brendan Dunkin, Greg Broome, Tricia Hamilton and Graham Hart, thanks for your willingness to be involved. We are a very diverse group of individuals with particular skills who work well for the club, providing expertise to ensure the club and premises is a pleasant environment for the members and we achieved much. As I have mentioned in this report, we have projects ahead of us and unknown maintenance issues that will require attention ensuring that your Premises Committee is never idle.

For fear of omitting someone from this acknowledgement of thanks – to all club members who willingly put their hand up to assist or bring to our attention items requiring attention - thank you for the wide range of fields covered by your expertise, enabling our aging 70-year-old building to be maintained and to function as we all would envisage.

Peter Rumble



It was with great sadness we learnt that our friend Peter (he preferred to be known by his middle name) had passed away on 23rd September 2025, aged 80 years due to heart failure.

Peter was a stalwart of the club - a dedicated clubman who joined forty-one years ago during 1984. He obtained his Bronze the same year.

Not one to sit around, Peter quickly became involved in the beach / patrolling side of the club with an interest in IRBs.

In 1988 he became the club's Vice-Captain, a role he would fill for three years, and a contributing member of the club's beach management team. Peter attained his Advanced Resuscitation Certificate, IRB Driver's Licence, and IRB Instructors Certificate.

As mentioned, Peter did enjoy the patrolling scene and when invited in 1988 to join the club's young IRB racing team, Peter did not hesitate and took to it with vigour. Combining patrolling

with IRB racing had a special appeal, as Peter always enjoyed the company of others, combining training and racing IRBs at Branch and NSW State Championships with an outstanding amount of success. Perhaps a highlight would be the 1990 NSW State Championships where Collaroy as a team swept all before them.

It is around this time of 1990 that, with the encouragement of then Club President John McGennan, work colleagues at Plateau Enterprises Alan Lance and Ken Coulston asked him to consider joining them in the club's March Past team. History will say that he did join and until he retired through illness in 2013, for thirty-three years Peter and his teammates were consistent performers.

At our Branch, NSW State and Australian Championships Peter won fifty-three medals in varying colours. Perhaps I could nominate a highlight of 2005 when the team won the gold medal at all three majors - the Branch, NSW State and Aussie titles.

Peter also completed two stints on the club's general committee (total seven years) and was a productive contributor, years 1988/1990 and 1994/1997.

Over the years whenever manpower has been required for carnivals or working bees, Peter was a solid performer, always putting his hand up to assist and as a member of the work party, played a major role when Collaroy hosted the 1987 NSW State Championships and the 1992 Australian Titles, and many other major carnivals over the years.

Even with a young family, Peter would find time to put in a few hours assisting with the voluntary Christmas Day patrols.

Peter was a member of the Australian armed forces and a decorated returned serviceman, having seen action in Vietnam with the Royal Australian Regiment from 1966 to 1967, firstly with the 6th then the 2nd battalion. He certainly saw action during the battle of Bribie (also known as Operation Bribie) where combat took place on 17th February 1967. It is acknowledged and remembered as one of the fiercest actions and one of the single deadliest days for the Australian forces during the Vietnam War. During the 5-hour battle, 8 soldiers were killed and 27, including Peter, were wounded.

Upon his return to Australia, Peter became heavily involved with the Vietnam Veterans and for a long period of time was President (Northern Sydney). Looking after his mates was a camaraderie he did enjoy, and he had latterly transferred his RSL membership to Wyong Sub-Branch to be closer to his family on the Central Coast. For several decades Peter was formerly a member of the Collaroy sub-Branch of the RSL, where he was their long-time Treasurer and Vice- President. Peter was recognised for his services to the RSL with Life Membership in 2019.

Although not well known, Peter was in fact an excellent swimmer. At one stage during his high school years, he held

every swimming record at The Henry Lawson High School in Grenfell, Central NSW, during his formative years.

Accompanying his good character and reflecting the respect with which he was held within the community, Peter held the position of Justice of the Peace (J.P.), a trust he took seriously for many years.

Peter is survived by his children Scott and Nicole, their partners and four grandchildren - Matilda, Nate, Jack and Luke.

The Executive and membership of the Collaroy Surf Club extend its condolences to the Rumble family on the passing of Peter, a person who enjoyed the company of his mates along with a tale or two over a beer.

A friend to many who gave so much and asked for little in return.

Evelyn Mary LANGBEIN, OAM



Following a brief period of illness, Evelyn Langbein passed away peacefully at her home within the RSL Retirement Village on Collaroy Plateau, on 25th September 2025, aged 95 years.

Evelyn's passing brought to a close a marvellous era in March Past Competition as given her age, club records indicate that she was the last surviving member of the 1946 Ladies March Past Team, winners of Collaroy's first NSW State March Past Championship Gold Medal.

Together with her younger sister Dorothy, they were the ultimate beach girls of the 1940's - being locals they spent all their spare time on or around Collaroy Beach and at the surf club. It was around 1946 that as a 16-year-old, Evelyn jumped at the invitational chance to join and become a member of the newly formed SLSA endorsed Ladies March Past Team to compete in local competitions. This team, put together by club Life Member Frank Hall, comprised mainly of wives, girlfriends and daughters of club members had an average age of 18-19 years.

The ladies March Past became very popular with exhibition marches at carnivals as these ladies, ahead of the times in their 2-piece swimsuits, doubled the crowd size such was their popularity. In early 1947, they were invited to compete in the first and only NSW Championship held as a fundraiser at the Sydney Sports Ground. Under the astute guidance of Frank, they did train hard and on the night were victorious, holding off a strong challenge from North Narrabeen to win the gold medal and with it the title of 1947 NSW Ladies March Past Champions. Unfortunately, women were not to be accepted into the Surf Life Saving movement for a further 33 years (1980), so the ladies' event was disbanded.

It would have been around this time that Evelyn was drawn to Netball, where she was to spend the remainder of her active life (70 plus years) integral in all aspects of this sport, initially competing, becoming an official then moving into

administration. For her lifetime of unwavering devotion and contribution to the sport, Evelyn was awarded the Order of Australia Medal (OAM) for services to NSW Netball in 2015.

Evelyn grew up with three sisters - Molly, Maureen and Dorothy (Dot) on Collaroy Plateau. She is survived by her sons Rob (Robbie) and Mark. Her son Brian and daughter Julie, both predeceased her in 2023. Evelyn had six grandchildren - Katie, Ryan, Holly, Morgyn, Josh and Matthew.

The membership of the Collaroy SLSC extends their condolences to Evelyns' family. The Northern Beaches sporting community, where Evelyn spent her entire life, is indeed poorer for her passing.

Peter Gordon Gibb



Collaroy lost a respected member when Peter Gibb passed away, aged 93 years, on 24th February 2026, following a brief period of illness.

As an 18-year-old in 1950, Peter joined Collaroy SLSC as an "active senior" member obtaining his Bronze Medallion that same year.

A popular patrolling member, Peter was known for his strong work ethic and a keen appreciation of the outdoors. Along with his lifelong love of the ocean, he did embrace this side of the movement with his mates on Collaroy Beach.

At the Annual Presentation night in 1952, he and three other members won the club's Patrol Boat Award. Peter and his six other patrol members also won the club's 1951/52 Patrol Efficiency Award (now known as Patrol of the Year). The lead up to winning this prestigious club award is worthy of a mention, as Peter was a member of the "Derros" patrol team led by Dick Twilight. Going into the last round of the season, they were equal on points and did win this competition on a count back from Dicks brother Stan Twilight's team, after Dick found a cigarette butt in the men's urinal, deducting Stan's team half a point. Although it was the early 50s when smoking was prevalent - one could imagine a few eyebrows would have been raised at this occurrence.

His administrative skills were becoming noted and in 1951/1952 Peter became part of the club's General Committee taking on

the role of Assistant Honorary Secretary. He was committed to the role and attended nine of the twelve monthly meetings.

Just as he was starting to establish himself within the club, he found his services in high demand with his profession as a qualified Chartered Accountant, at which he excelled within the business community.

His business direction changed dramatically when he entered the mining industry, eventually becoming Managing Director of several copper, gold and coal mining companies throughout the 1970s, 80s and 90s across Australia and throughout Papua New Guinea. Peter played a pivotal role in the development of one of Australia's largest open cut copper mines – a contribution that left a lasting mark on the industry.

Upon retirement, Peter embraced the country life with his wife of sixty-nine years Julie, settling in Mudgee, NSW, where he purchased a series of rural properties, raising cattle, sheep and establishing a vineyard.

Peter is survived by his devoted wife Julie, his children Michelle and Paul, his five grandchildren Gordon, James, Dirk, Melissa and Jason; and his eight great-grandchildren Leo, Sonny, Vince, Stormy, Naomi, Isaac, Aubrey and Eli.

The Collaroy Surf Life Saving Club membership extends their condolences to Peter's family on his passing. The family have asked if Peter's wish "for his ashes to be scattered off Collaroy Beach from a Surf Boat" would be possible. Without hesitation, the club's executive has agreed and, on a date to be determined by both parties, Peter's wish will be honoured.

Those early years as a Life Saver on Collaroy Beach became some of the most treasured in his life. Not only character building, with members in the club he was to form friendships that endured for decades, and when time would permit, he did return to Collaroy, reminiscing fondly about "some of the best years of my life."

It was sadness we learnt ex club member Jason Farrell passed away on 11th July 2026, aged 61, after a seven year battle with MND.

Jason obtained his Bronze in 1990 and rowed for Collaroy during his time with the club.

FINANCIAL REPORT

This is my first year as Honorary Treasurer and I'd like to thank the outgoing Treasurer, Stuart Spencer for all his efforts over the last 6 years as Treasurer and support throughout handover to me.

The Club reported an accounting loss of \$57,393 for the financial year ended 30 April 2026.

The Club remains in a strong financial position, with Cash Reserves of \$623,718, an increase of \$22k from last year.

While cashflow for the year was positive, the accounting loss reflects:

Treating the \$37,750 NSW Government Infrastructure grant received for the Training Education & Development Space (TEDS) project as a provision in the Balance Sheet, as the Club hasn't spent money to offset the grant yet.

Allowance for increased depreciation of \$43,721 for surf boats and SS Vehicle.

Key points on the financial results for the year include:

- Subscriptions increased by almost \$10k to \$73,840 (equivalent to 2024 year).
- Operating Income was down \$14k as Social Fund net result was reduced, and the Club did not host IRB Premiership carnival which generated \$8k income in 2025. While BBQ income was reduced due to decreased carnivals hosted, it still ran at a surplus of \$11k.
- Fund Raising income increased by \$7k with very successful Golf Day and Ocean Swim events.
- The Weekend at the Roy carnival continues to grow and contributed a net result of \$3k.
- Sponsorship income increased \$12k for the year, which included new sponsorships for the Cadet Program and Nippers Boards.
- Premises Equipment cost increased by \$37k with improvements in BBQ of \$16k, kitchen exhaust upgrade of \$13k and new hot water system of \$9k.
- Overall Repairs & Maintenance increased by \$20k, which included SS vehicle repairs of \$5k, and Premises repairs for Commercial Cleaning \$4k, Hall Floor Maintenance \$4k, Painting \$2k.
- The Club also invested in 6 new Rescue Boards (\$10k) this season via the SLSA Beach Safety Equipment Fund (BSEF) Grant.

The Club continued to invest in our swim program with the Narrabeen Swim Academy. The improvements in the level of swimming especially with Junior members is noticeable, and all members (seniors and juniors) are encouraged to attend.

In the new financial year, the Club is planning to invest in the upgrade of a new cool room and beer system to replace the existing aging and unreliable facilities. The Club was successful in applying for the NSW Government Surf Club Facility Program Grant which will substantially contribute to the cost of the project.

Thanks to our Sponsors, Donors and Grantors for their valuable support which is much appreciated by the whole Club.

Thanks to everyone involved in organising highly successful Fund Raising and Member events during the year including the annual Golf Day, Ocean Swim, Weekend at the Roy and the Club Ball.

The Club also thanks SNB, SLS NSW, SLSA, Northern Beaches Council, the NSW Government and the Australian Government for their support directly and indirectly during the year.

Thanks to our auditor, Jack McCann and his team for their professional efforts.

Finally, I'd like to thank the Executive, General Committee, Expenditure Review Committee, Premises Committee, JAB Committee and all members of the Club for their efforts during the year.

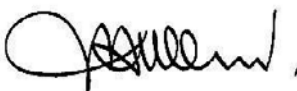

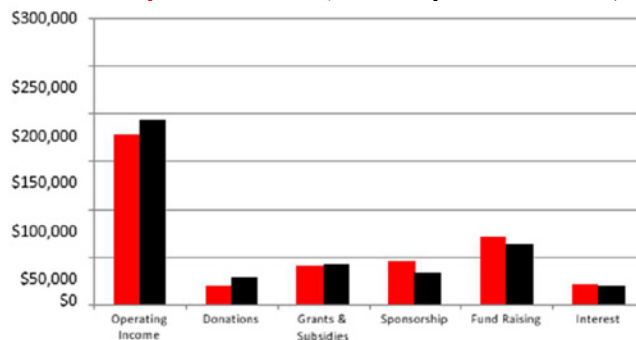

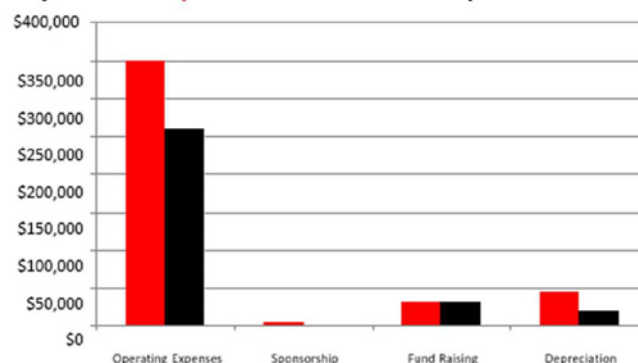

Notes of the Financial Statements for the 12 months ended 30 April 2026

Note 1 - Summary of significant accounting policies

a) Basis of Accounting

These financial statements are a special purpose financial report prepared for use by the Executive Committee and members of the Association. 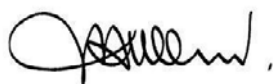
